What are the Cub Scout Ranks?

- Lions: Kindergarten—an introduction to Cub Scouts with short monthly meetings
- Bobcat: Every age level—Scouts learn the basics of Cub Scouting
- Tigers: 1st Grade—Focus on health/nutrition, fun and games, and introduce skills and values
- Wolves: 2nd Grade—Focus on core Cub Scout values and skills
- Bears: 3rd Grade—Focus on building and developing skills and values
- Webelos/AOLs: 4th & 5th Grade—Focus on leadership, independence and transitioning Boy Scouts—an 18 month continuum with Scouts Bridging in February of 5th grade

What are Core Rank Requirements?

- Adventures and required activities that all Cub Scouts must complete to “Make Rank” at each rank level
- Each rank has its own requirements, but the following themes are included:
 - Duty to God—faith based adventures are a rank requirement at all levels
 - Duty to Country—adventures stress patriotism, civics, and community service
 - Scout Skills—adventures develop **outdoor skills** such as knots and pocket knives, and **life skills** such as safe tool use, leadership, teamwork, and communication
 - Nature and the Outdoors—adventures stress hiking, camping, and learning about nature
 - Health and Fitness—adventures stress nutrition, exercise, and healthy habits

How will the Girls Pack be organized?

- Fall 2019: Girls Dens will begin meeting; Girls will be invited to all Boys Pack activities
- Winter 2020: Girls Pack will begin making its own leadership decisions and may continue to attend Boys Pack events or plan separate events for the Girls Pack
- Spring 2020: Girls Pack and Boys Pack will plan their next Pack year, deciding which events to collaborate on and which events to hold separately
- June 1, 2020: Girls Pack will be officially separate from the Boys Pack, though both Packs may continue to collaborate as they see fit. This assumes enough numbers and adult leadership.

How is Cub Scouts Different from Girl Scouts—Why Cub Scouts?

- Cub Scouts is a BSA (Boy Scouts of America) program; Girl Scouts is a separate entity
- Cub Scouts is divided into ranks by grade level with core requirements to “make rank”
- Girl Scouts has no core rank requirements, allowing for variations in quality and content of programming
- Cub Scouts is a family-based program; Girl Scouts is more girl-based

Why Separate Packs for Boys and Girls?

- There is no Girl Scout Program at STM—Cub Scouts will fill that gap
- Facility size may not accommodate as the Girls’ Pack grows
- Allows the Packs to collaborate if desired or choose separate activities to meet their needs

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
